NOR WICH. APRIL 22. This Exering, a lettle after 7 o'Clock, Mr. David Nevins. who Yefterday Forencen, went Express from this Town, to obtain Intelligence, returned from Providence, with the fellowing important Advices.

N Tuesday livening 1st, Advice was received here from Botton --- that a Detachment of the King's Troops had fired upon and killed a Number of the Inhabitants of Lexington, about Twelve Miles from Boftent in Confequence of which an Engagement had happened.

Joon receiving this alarming Intelligence, the Inhabitants of Providence immediately affembled the Offigers of the Independent Companies and Militia with a Number of Gentlemen of the Town, had a Meeting, and two Expresses were dispan hed for Lexington to obtain authentic Accounts while others were tent to different parts of this Colony and Connecticut.

The Expresses that went to Lexington returned Yesterday Morning, and relate in Substance the follow-

On Tuefday Night, the 18th Inflant, about 1300 Troops very privately embarked at Charlestown-Fer-Ty, in Boats, and after Landing at Cambridge, proareded towards Concord, in order, as is supposed, to deflroy the Province Magazine.

46 At Lexington, early next Morning, they came to with a small Number of Men, who were performing the Manual Exercise, and after according them in Lan guage the most prophane and infalting, ordered them to lay down their Arms and disperse, which they a first refused to do, but on being threatened they began to disperse, and were immediately fired upon and of them killed.

The Troops afterwards proceeded to Concord where they destroyed about 60 Barrels of Flour, and fome Gun-carriges; after which they began to retreat when about 300 Americans coming up, a Skirmish cafued.

" At Lexington the troops received a Reinforce ment of 1000 Men and Two Field-pieces, notwithstand ing which, the Americans continued to push them closely, and pursued them about 12 Miles, to Bunker's. Hill, in Charlestown, when Night coming on the firing ceafed. Our People not thinking it prudent to attack them in fo advantgeous a Situation without Artillery.

** The Troops immediately intrenched on the Hill. and the Americans, after placing a firong Guard to observe their Motions, marched to Cambridge, a which, and other Places, large Bodies of Americans have fince affem bled,

" On Thursday the 20th Inflant, about four o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Troops fuddenly decamped, embarked on board Boats at Charlestown, and returned te Boston. That of the King's Troops, One Lieute. nant, and about 70 Privates were killed, a confiderable Number wounded, and about 30 taken Prifoners, among whom are Two Captains: That on the Paul of the Americans, about 30 were killed, and 3 or 1 taken Prifoners; not a fingle wounded Man found alive The Troops having, with a Barbaraty heretofore unpractifed by British Soldiers, destroyed all they men with: That at Lexington they burnt Four dwelling and Two Out Houses, an aged Man whom they found fick in his Bed, was run through with a Bayonet; and Two aged and infirm Perfons were shot in another House: That although the Americans were continual. ly reinforced by fmall Parties, not more than 300 were at any Time engaged : That they beltaved with the greatest Intrepidity; and had they been joined by the main Body which assembled at Concord, while waits ing to receive the Troops on another. I'his Morning two Gentlemen, Members of Rhode Island Assembly, at Providence, informed Mr. Nevins That on their Way from the Eastward, they heard heavy and continued Firing, which they imagined wa another Engagement, between the Americans and King's Troops at Marshfield; and added, that the perceived in that Quarter, a Line of Fire, about Hal a Mile in Lergth, which had much the Appearance of Building burning.
